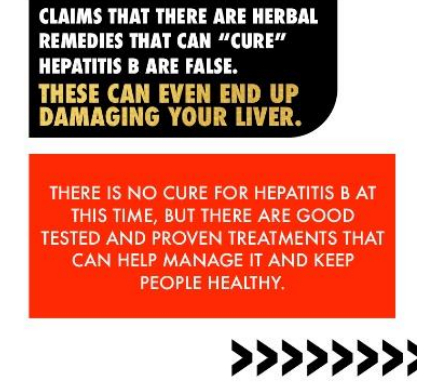

INTRODUCTION TO HEPATITIS B

 <p>INTRO TO HEP B & LIVER CANCER</p> <p>Hep B is one of the most common infections in the world (300 million people live with it worldwide). It affects your liver.</p>	<p>Introduction #1</p> <p>Hepatitis B is the most common serious liver infection in the world. It is caused by the hepatitis B virus that attacks and injures the liver. Two billion people (or 1 in 3) have been infected and about 300 million people are living with a chronic hepatitis B infection. 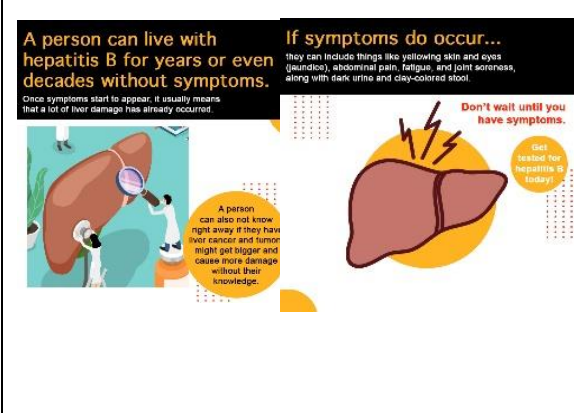

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MANAGEMENT



	<p>Management #1</p> <p>Hepatitis B is a “silent epidemic” because most people do not have symptoms when they are newly infected or living with hepatitis B. Thus, they can unknowingly spread the virus to others and continue the silent spread of hepatitis B. If the virus is not properly managed, the liver can still be silently damaged which can develop into serious liver disease such as cirrhosis or liver cancer. 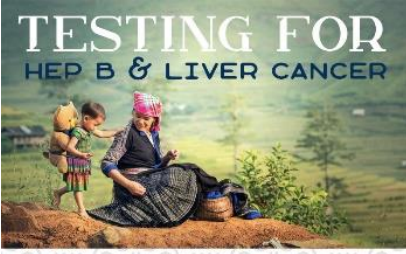

	<p>Management #4</p> <p>Fact Check: Herbal remedies do not cure #hepatitisB. 	<p>Management #5</p> <p>If you tested positive for #hepatitisB, the first step to managing your health is to visit your doctor. During a physical exam, your health care provider will ask about your symptoms and any risk factors that you may have for liver cancer. SYMPTOMS

 <p>A person can live with hepatitis B for years or even decades without symptoms. Once symptoms start to appear, it usually means that a lot of liver damage has already occurred.</p> <p>If symptoms do occur... they can include things like yellowing skin and eyes (jaundice), abdominal pain, fatigue, and joint soreness, along with dark urine and clay-colored stool.</p> <p>Don't wait until you have symptoms. Get tested for hepatitis B today!</p> <p>A person can also not know right away if they have liver cancer and tumor might get bigger and cause more damage without their knowledge.</p>	<p>Symptoms #1 and #2</p> <p>Hepatitis B is called a "silent infection" because most people do not have any symptoms when they are first infected or living with the virus. Testing #4

The hepatitis B blood test requires only one sample of blood, and your health care provider should order the "Hepatitis B Panel," which includes three parts. The most important thing to remember is that hepatitis B is a chronic medical condition that can be successfully managed if you take good care of your health and your liver. You should expect to live a long, full life.

The blood test is a very simple one that takes less than five minutes, and you should have the results within two days.

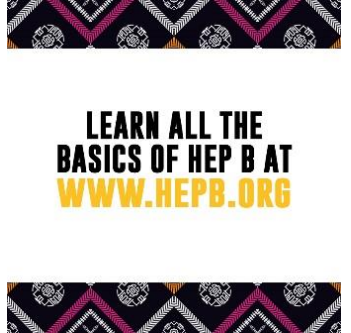

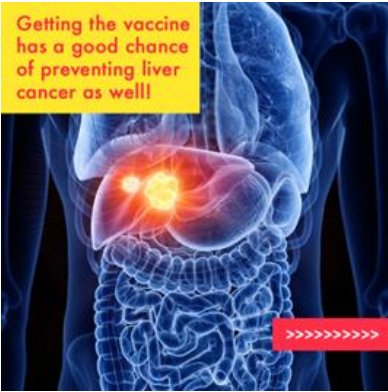

TRANSMISSION

	<p>Transmission #1</p> <p>Hepatitis B is NOT transmitted casually. It cannot be spread through toilet seats, doorknobs, sneezing, coughing, hugging, or eating meals with someone who is living with hepatitis B.</p> <p>Learn more: https://www.hepb.org/prevention-and-diagnosis/transmission/</p>
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	<p>Transmission #2</p> <p>Babies born to a mother living with hepatitis B have a greater than 90% chance of developing chronic hepatitis B if they are not properly treated at birth. 	 <p>Transmission #3</p> <p>The hepatitis B virus is transmitted through blood and bodily fluids. All sexual partners, family and close household members living with someone who has hepatitis B should be tested and vaccinated for #hepB.</p> <p>Learn more: https://www.hepb.org/prevention-and-diagnosis/transmission/</p>
	<p>Transmission #4</p> <p>A risk factor is anything that increases a person’s chance of developing a disease such as cancer. 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VACCINE

 <p>There is a vaccine that protects against hepatitis B.
